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1. Overview of Financial Results for the Period

(1) Overview of Business Performance

The global economy remained uncertain during the first quarter of the fiscal year ending March 31, 2026, because of the worldwide impact of U.S. tariffs, Chinese economic trends, exchange rate trends, and ongoing geopolitical risks.

Against this backdrop, the semiconductor, electronic device, and printed circuit board markets saw stable operations supported by a moderate recovery in global demand for PCs, smartphones, and other products, although related capital investment remained restrained. While the server market experienced new demand driven by generative AI, investment in existing data center servers was again constrained and postponed. While the flat panel display market experienced higher demand for organic light-emitting displays for smartphones and tablets, liquid crystal display panel manufacturers operated at low levels amid lackluster demand for their offerings. In the visual imaging market, cinema attendances remained sluggish amid diversifying entertainment options, offsetting the impact of resolving movie shortages stemming from the Hollywood strike and recovering investment appetites. General imaging market conditions remained firm amid a rising need for advanced video production for events and other activities.

The average value of the yen against the U.S. dollar during the first quarter of the fiscal year was \\$145, a year-on-year appreciation of \\$10.

Consolidated net sales increased 2.2% year on year, to \(\frac{4}{3}\)8,356 million. Operating profit increased 182.5%, to \(\frac{4}{9}\)68 million. Ordinary profit increased 10.1%, to \(\frac{4}{1}\),606 million. However, the Company posted a loss attributable to owners of parent of \(\frac{4}{2}\),827 million, compared with a profit attributable to owners of parent of \(\frac{4}{2}\)97 million a year earlier.

Segment results were as follows.

Industrial Processes Business

UV Lamps

Notwithstanding a stronger yen, demand recovered steadily for such final products as personal computers and smartphones. Supporting this recovery was demand for generative AI semiconductor-related products and solid installed equipment utilization, which contributed to higher revenues and segment sales.

OA Lamps

Segment earnings decreased despite favorable market conditions, reflecting a higher yen.

Optical Equipment Lamps

Steady demand in the flat panel display market for OLED displays for smartphones and tablets boosted revenues and segment sales.

Optical Equipment (Lithography Equipment)

Demand again recovered steadily for personal computers, smartphones, and other final products, increasing sales of direct imaging lithography equipment. At the same time, while demand rose for generative AI semiconductors related to advanced package substrates, investments were constrained or postponed owing to sluggish demand from existing data centers, resulting in lower stepper revenues and segment sales.

Optical Equipment (Others)

While maintenance services revenue for EUV light sources for EUV lithography mask inspections decreased, revenues rose for photo-alignment equipment for flat panel displays, boosting segment sales.

Earnings declined, however, owing to higher upfront investments related to digital lithography technology systems.

Industrial Processes business sales therefore increased 1.5%, to \\ \text{\fi}15,824 \text{ million.} Operating profit dropped 68.9%, to \\ \text{\fi}326 \text{ million.}

Visual Imaging Business

Projector Lamps

Sales of xenon lamps for cinema projectors were down owing to sluggish cinema operations and an accelerating shift toward solid-state light sources. Revenues from lamps for general imaging projectors also declined with solid-state light source uptakes. A stronger yen also fueled a segment sales downturn.

Cinema Projectors

Demand for replacement models recovered on investment appetites recovering after the Hollywood strikes, boosting digital cinema projector revenues and segment sales.

General Imaging Projectors

While demand remained steady for advanced visual production, particularly for events, a stronger yen reduced segment sales.

Earnings were up as the loss on valuation of inventories was lower than a year earlier and profitability improved on a product portfolio review.

Visual Imaging business sales therefore increased 4.1%, to ¥18,303 million. Operating profit was ¥352 million, from an operating loss of ¥474 million in the previous corresponding period.

Life Sciences Business

Overall revenues were again solid, boosting segment sales. Earnings increased as strategic selection of investment targets in new projects improved profitability.

Life Sciences business sales therefore increased 3.1%, to ¥1,592 million. Operating profit was ¥114 million, from an operating loss of ¥171 million in the previous corresponding period.

Photonics Solutions Business

Revenues declined due to lower sales of devices for industrial applications and others. Earnings were up, however, as focused selection and concentration of projects improved profitability.

Photonics Solutions business sales thus declined 8.8%, to \(\xi\$2,325 million. Operating profit was \(\xi\$227 million, from an operating loss of \(\xi\$59 million in the previous corresponding period.

Others

Although power supply sales increased on capacity utilization recoveries at customer production lines, earnings declined primarily due to an increase in selling, general, and administrative expenses.

Others segment sales thus increased 7.7%, to ¥316 million. There was an operating loss of ¥23 million, from an operating profit of ¥3 million in the previous corresponding period.

(2) Overview of Financial Position

Assets

Total assets at the end of the term were \(\frac{4}{2}86,935\) million, down \(\frac{4}{10},368\) million from a year earlier. The principal factors in this reduction were a decrease in cash and deposits to pay dividends and taxes and declines in notes and accounts receivable and contract assets from customer collections.

Liabilities

Total liabilities decreased ¥747 million, to ¥96,047 million. This was due primarily to a decline in income taxes payable owing to tax payments and a reduction in provision for bonuses after bonus disbursements. These factors offset higher other current liabilities, including deposits related to bonus payments and accrued expenses for business restructuring.

Net Assets

Net assets decreased \(\frac{4}{9}\),621 million, to \(\frac{4}{190}\),888 million. Prime factors in this decline were lower retained earnings owing to dividend payments, a net loss for the quarter, and a decrease in the foreign currency translation adjustment stemming from the yen's appreciation during the term.

(3) Explanation of Consolidated Earnings Forecasts and Other Forward-looking statements

For the fiscal year ending March 31, 2026, management has retained the full-year forecasts announced on May 13, 2025. These forecasts are based on information currently available to the Company and on certain assumptions that management deems reasonable. Actual results may vary due to various factors.

(Significant Subsequent Events)

(Acquisition of a Subsidiary)

At the Board of Directors meeting held on July 28th, 2025, USHIO INC. (hereinafter the "Company") resolved to acquire all shares of a subsidiary that OSRAM GmbH plans to establish (hereinafter the "New Subsidiary"), and to make it a subsidiary of the Company. OSRAM GmbH is a sub-subsidiary of ams-OSRAM AG (Head Office: Tobelbader Straße 30, 8141 Premstaetten, Austria; CEO: Aldo Kamper). The New Subsidiary will operate the lamp business for industrial and entertainment applications (hereinafter the "Business") currently operated by the ams-OSRAM AG Group (hereinafter "ams-OSRAM"). The Company also resolved to take over assets related to this business from ams-OSRAM (hereinafter the "Takeover"), and to conclude a share and asset transfer agreement with ams-OSRAM for the Takeover.

1. Reason for the acquisition of shares

ams-OSRAM is a global leader in semiconductor and traditional automotive & industrial specialty lamps technologies, engaged in the design, manufacture, and sale of semiconductor devices such as LEDs, lasers, and sensors for automotive, industrial, medical, and consumer applications, as well as specialty lamps for semiconductor manufacturing equipment. The scope of this transfer includes specialty lamps for semiconductor manufacturing equipment, among others.

Under the New Growth Strategy "Revive Vision 2030," which was formulated in 2024, the Company is steadily implementing initiatives for business portfolio revamping, structural reforms, and improvement of capital efficiency. This Transaction is part of the business portfolio revamping, aimed at strengthening the profit base of the Industrial Processes business, particularly the light source business centered on the semiconductor field. This will essentially be achieved through optimization of production and significant improvement of efficiency.

By taking advantage of the Takeover to integrate the technological advantage, patents, and manufacturing know-how held by both companies in the light source business, the Company aims for the following effects.

- i. Further sales opportunities in the semiconductor lamp market, which is expected to continue to grow
- ii. Expansion of contribution to profits through optimization of production and significant improvement of efficiency

The acquisition of the Business, which is already recording stable profits today, that is also expected to achieve a return on invested capital exceeding 10%, from ams-OSRAM will significantly contribute to the achievement of the quantitative targets (ROE 12% or more) that the Company has set forth in its New Growth Strategy, "Revive Vision 2030."

Through the Takeover, the Company will further strengthen its competitiveness and raise the level of its revenue base in order to expand the IP business, and lead it to future consolidation of the light source industry and a faster improvement in production efficiency.
